1. Purpose of the report/Strategic issue for consideration

1.1 Present the Vision Zero South West (VZSW) financial outturn position as at 31st March 2024.

2. Recommendation

2.1 The Board be made aware of the financial outturn position as at 31st March 2024.

3. Salient Points

3.1 The Office of Police & Crime Commissioner (OPCC) is the lead financial party for the Vision Zero South West collaboration. A balance of £5.24m was held in a ringfenced reserve at the start of the financial year.





Vision Zero South West Forecast – Running Costs

- 3.2 The Partnerships planned net expenditure, before any capital spending, was originally predicted in the 5-year plan to be a surplus of £813,667. The table below summarises the actual outturn income and expenditure and shows an actual surplus position of £455,075. Since the last forecast presented to the board on 12th March 2024 this is a decrease of £21,260. The main driver being a higher equipment costs offset by slightly higher than previously expected income.
- 3.3 A full detailed breakdown of this can be found in Appendix A.

- 3.4 During the financial year, income generated from Speed Awareness Courses of £4,484,898 is higher than budget expectations by £47,545 and exceeds last year's income by £158,308.
- 3.5 The graph in Appendix B displays income levels by month and splits out the additional £10 of income the Partnership receives from training provider TTC for the increased course fees, along with the additional income from Operation Snap activities.
- 3.6 Court costs recovered have ended the financial year at £440,793 which was £66,810 lower than budget. Other driver education course income of £138,531 also ended the year lower than the ambitious budget, although increased significantly towards the end of the financial year.
- 3.7 Staffing expenditure was £115,709 higher than budget, increased costs mainly caused by a higher increase in pay rises than originally budgeted and higher than expected allowances, have been partly offset by vacancies due to recruitment delays and staff turnover.





- 3.8 Running costs ended the financial year £51,912 higher than budget, postage costs are lower than originally expected, although offset by additional equipment.
- 3.9 VZSW core costs increased by £47,320 compared to budget, mainly caused by higher increase in pay rises than originally budgeted and higher than budgeted maintenance costs.

Vision Zero South West Forecast – Pooled Fund

3.10 At the start of the financial year the opening balance of the reserve was £5,242,200. The Partnership invested a spend of £1,319,159 during the year; including the transfer of surplus this resulted in a closing balance at 31st March 2024 of £4,378,136.

3.11 The remaining previously approved expenditure will fall into future years. The available balance after the approved and ringfenced amounts is £1,340,397. This is a reduction of £163,707 since the last finance update due to the surplus movement of £23,609, additional approved expenditure of £96,000 from the prior





board, £150,000 of the tasking budget being reallocated to camera upgrades, offset by in year underspends and budget removed due to no longer being expected to happen.

- 3.12 Investment in vehicles of £247,145 was made during the year. This includes the purchase and fitting out of some of the delayed seven speed detection vans and two motorcycle replacements. The remainder of the budget has been rolled forward to next financial year.
- 3.13 Tasking budget of £174,334 was spent this financial year on overtime (officers on tactical tasking activities), drug wipes, the lift legend campaign and high harm routes trailer.
- 3.14 Activity B spend of £391,874 includes the following as detailed in the Road Safety Delivery Plan.
 - £130,000 on Post Crash Response and Care
 - £93,966 on Motorcyclists
 - £82,288 on Pedestrians
 - £42,642 on Younger Drivers
 - £32,617 from the Call for Ideas budget
 - £5,943 on Cyclists
 - £2,340 from the Contingency Fund
 - £2,078 on Older Drivers
- 3.15 £101,176 of the Comms and Engagement budget has been spent, along with £7,183 on the Ford Focus RS engagement car and low powered engagement motorcycle.
- 3.16 The Board agreed to hold £1,500,000 to fund the upgrading of camera stock. £39,965 was spend in financial year 21/22 and £104,652 spent during 22/23. A further £336,884 of this was spent during this financial year with £1,018,498 remaining.

4. Conclusion

- 4.1 Income generated from Speed Awareness Courses ended the financial year higher than budget expectations and last year. This is offset by lower-than-expected court costs recovered and other driver education courses.
- 4.2 A net expenditure surplus of £455,075 was transferred to the Vision Zero reserve at the end of the financial year. After accounting for expenditure already approved the available balance on the Pooled fund is £1,340,397. This will allow for continued investment in projects and initiatives to improve safety on the roads.

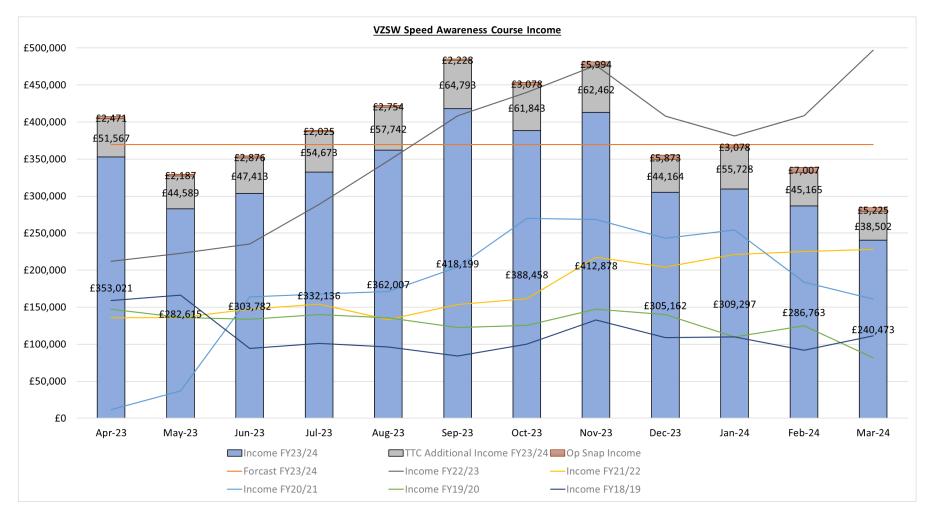

1.0 PURPOSE

1.1 To seek Board approval to a proposed model of delivery, through Devon & Cornwall Police Performance and Analysis Department, for the provision of road safety data and analysis to Vision Zero South West, and to agree an additional revenue spend of £7k per annum to enable recruitment and delivery.

2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 That Partners:

- **a.** Agree proposed data and analysis provision to VZSW through Devon & Cornwall.
- **b.** Agree additional revenue spend of £7k per annum to enable recruitment of the identified posts.

3.0 DEVELOPMENT GROUP ASSURANCE & STRATEGIC FIT

- **3.1** The overarching strategic aim of VZSW is to work together to drive changes that will prevent death and serious injury from occurring on the roads of Devon and Cornwall. Critical to achieving this is the partnership ability to enable a detailed understanding of the issues and evidence base for activity through examination and analysis of data.
- **3.2** In supporting the proposals set out in this report, this will link into the safe system pillars of Safe Roads and roadsides, Safe Road Users, Safe Speeds, Safe Vehicles and Post Collision Response.
- **3.3** Due to timings, this proposal has not been presented to the Development Group. Given the criticality of minimising delays in recruiting people into post, rather than delay this until September, it is being presented to the Board for approval alongside the budget update; with the paper serving as a reference for discussion.

4.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY OF PROPOSAL

- 4.1 In recent weeks, conversations have been held with the senior leadership team within Performance & Analysis (P&A) Department to inform the proposal to create a road safety thematic team within P&A with ringfenced support provided to the VZSW Governance Board to produce the annual Strategic Assessment, thematic problem profiles and wider partnership data needs. There is an existing Strategic Analyst role profile within Force, which is fit for purpose, subject to a few minor amendments/adjustments to incorporate the development and maintenance of tools such as Power BI and SQL, ensuring continuity of VZSW dashboards.
- **4.2** P&A have proposed the addition of a 0.5 FTE Performance and Planning Manager to carry out the coordination of performance review, planning and risk management, including the identification, implementation and monitoring of changes and innovations that will contribute to the delivery of improved outcomes. This role will help provide opportunity to the Governance Board to monitor and review performance against delivery plans, including associated risks, enabling intervention and support where necessary.
- **4.3** At the VZSW Board in September 2023, funding for 2 Research & Evaluation Officer posts was agreed. Having successfully recruited one candidate, it is proposed that the second post is converted into an Intelligence Researcher to assist in informing problem profiles with redacted intelligence to enable more focused application of tactical activity.
- 4.4 The proposed design would therefore consist of a part time Performance and Planning Manager, Strategic Analyst and Intelligence Researcher (in addition to the newly recruited Research & Evaluation Officer). It is that this would enable a high-quality service to be provided, and both sustainable and resilient. Should

a post become vacant in the future, there are post holders who can guide and support new appointees and an existing integrated model for the delivery of performance and data products.

- **4.5** The proposed model also provides a 'home' for the function within policing and is a natural fit. The P&A Department will provide professional lead and direction, including CPD activity. A Service Level Agreement (SLA) would be put in place to safeguard partner's influence and engagement in delivery and products. The SLA will ensure that the roles are ringfenced to VZSW as identified in point 4.1 above. This will work in the same way as our recently recruited Specialist Problem Solver who is dedicated to VZSW Road Safety activity.
- **4.6** Minor amendments/alterations can be made to the Performance and Planning Manager and Strategic Analyst roles; which should not trigger a Job Evaluation review.
- 4.7 All posts will be both internally and externally advertised.

5.0 FINANCIAL REQUEST

5.1 This paper seeks an uplift of £7k per annum to enable the recruitment of the individuals required to deliver the function. The additional costs have been calculated based the following staffing costs.

1.0 PURPOSE

1.1 To seek Board approval towards the development of the Centre for Post-Collision Research, Innovation and Translation.

1.2 The Centre, will be the first of its kind, bringing together multidisciplinary expertise in clinical care, operational delivery, data science, psychology, ethnography, behavioural science, educationalists, and others to provide a fertile ground for innovation, impact and translation.

1.3 By bringing together these experts into a single hub, the Centre will foster collaboration, innovation, knowledge sharing, and the exchange of best practices.

2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

- **2.1** That Partners approve:
 - **a.** £250,000 one-off Enterprise Development Fund (covering 3 years from inception)
 - b. An annual Enabler Fund of £50,000 per year for 3 years

3.0 DEVELOPMENT GROUP ASSURANCE & STRATEGIC FIT

- **3.1** The overarching strategic aim of VZSW is to work together to drive changes that will prevent death and serious injury from occurring on the roads of Devon and Cornwall and improve our post collision response and care.
- **3.2** In supporting the proposals set out in this report this will link into the safe system pillar of post-crash care. The group discussions very much acknowledged that this represented an exciting opportunity to strengthen knowledge and work towards our overall ambitions to reduce those killed and seriously injured.
- **3.3** Detailed discussions of this proposal took place on 2nd May 2024 and the Development Group in consultation with the Chair was satisfied it should be presented to VZSW Governance Board with a strong recommendation for approval.

4.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY OF PROPOSAL

- **4.1** Road trauma is a leading cause of death and disability worldwide. We believe this can be improved in order to reduce death and disability associated with road industry whilst using a scientific lens to improve outcomes.
- **4.2** The Centre for Post-Collision Research, Innovation and Translation, will bring together multidisciplinary expertise and provide a fertile ground for innovation, impact and translation.
- **4.3** The Centre will be located in the South-West, and it is envisaged that a large portion of the work will be locally focused and will be delivered in partnership with VZSW. VZSW

will be invited to sit on the Steering Group as a key partner in the development of the Centre.

- **4.4** In phase 1 (2024-2027) the Centre will be 'virtual' and primarily involved with the delivery of a detailed programme of research and translating this into positive impact.
- **4.5** By 2027, we expect to have proven the concept and established the Centre within the national framework for post-collision response and care, whilst being self-sustainable.
- **4.6** DAAT will procure goods and services according to its standard procurement policy.
- **4.7** The intended outcome is that by working with VZSW and other partners we deliver a Centre for a regional, national and international reputation for research, education and translation to impact.
- **4.8** Evaluation will necessarily be complex but can be assessed across the following domains, reporting to VZSW can be made at key intervals providing assurance:
 - Research output
 - Funding acquisition
 - Collaborations and partnerships
 - Clinical and operational impact
 - Education and training
 - Policy influence
 - Innovation and technology transfer

5.0 FINANCIAL REQUEST

- **5.1** In March 2024, the Road Safety Trust awarded the DAAT £492,000 in order to fund a detailed programme of research starting in September 2024.
- **5.2** DAAT seek an enterprise funder who can support the costs of kick-starting and developing the Centre and those costs which are traditionally more difficult to secure through project funding. This funding is vital in ensuring we can kick-start the new Centre, develop new partnerships, extend reach and impact and secure long-term success and sustainability.
- **5.3** £250,000 is required for the Enterprise Development Fund (2024-2027) for the initial investment which will drive development during the crucial first phase of the Centre.
- **5.4** A further £50,000 is required annually (for 3 years) for the Enterprise Enabler Fund and this will provide leadership and coordination of research effort and a necessary travel and dissemination budget will be required.
- **5.5** Should there be any surplus funds, these will either be returned to VZSW, or by agreement, reinvested to a suitable project.

6.0 IMPLEMENTATION TIMESCALE & NEXT STEPS

- **6.1** Subject to final approval from Vision Zero South West Governance Board, the intended outcome is that by working with VZSW and other partners, we deliver a Centre for a regional, national and international reputation for research, education and translation to impact.
- 6.2 Key milestones include:
- Form Research & Management team July 2024
- Establish Steering Group September 2024
- Create new website & online presence September 2024
- Inform, involve & inspire strategic partners, stakeholders & general public December 2024
- To deliver a multi-modal package of research 2024-2027

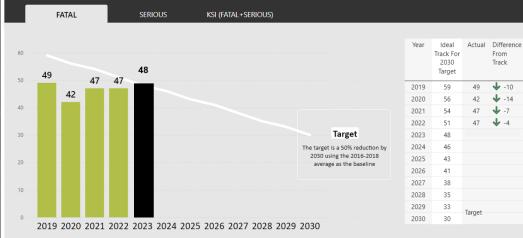


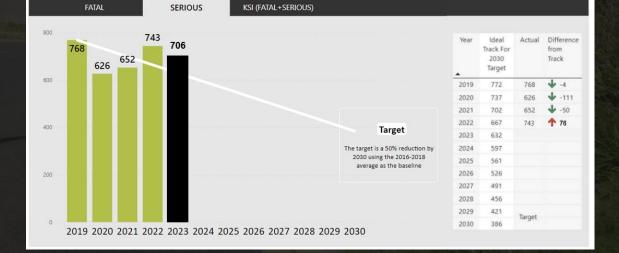

VZSW ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT

This report is to provide the VZSW Governance Board with assurances regarding progress of activity funded or supported by the Partnership and to highlight delivery successes, by all involved. Detail provided, is either for the calendar year of 2023 or financial year 2023/24. Also included, is a look forward to activity planned or in the pipeline for future approval. The report is broken down into the following three areas:

- Activity A enforcement
- Activity B education and training
- **Comms & Engagement** campaigns targeting behaviour change

Activity A Enforcement

Recognising that enforcement plays a key role in casualty reduction, we have increased our posture to use assets, in an optimised way. We have made strides towards building an anywhere, anytime enforcement strategy to build a fear of detection, with aspirations for long-term behavioural change at the centre. Enforcement will contribute towards casualty reduction, but it also links into crime, by denying criminals the use of the road.

Delivery successes include:

- **156,627 total proceedable NoIPS** (notices of intended prosecution) detected by cameras, officers and artificial intelligence roadside trailer;
- **86,817 NSAC*** (national speed awareness courses) delivered. In addition, circa 14,000 drivers eligible for points and fine and over 1,000 taken to court;
- **Speed detection officers & special constables** (operating with handheld Trucam) caried out 4,655 hours of speed enforcement, detecting 83,627;
- **3,085 combined course delivery** for What's Driving Us, National Risk Rider Awareness Course, Your Belt Your Life, Safe & Considerate Driving;
- Secured new 10-year contract for National Driver Offender Retraining Scheme delivery;
- **Camera programme** 10 upgraded, 5 repaired and 7 site installations are progressing;
- **Insurance, Licence & Tax** 1,952 vehicles seized for no insurance and / or licence and a further 288 for no tax; and
- **Partnership High Harm Routes** 14 routes received enforcement activity on at least one occasion, some multiple dates.

***National Driver Offender Retraining Scheme** 97.02% of clients who attended, rated the course as Good or Excellent. 95.6% noticed a positive change in their driving behaviour with 97.2% feeling more positive towards the speed limit. This is encouraging showing the difference education has on those who attend and is fundamental to our approach in making roads safer.

Op Dragoon – is carried out where there is an elevated risk and serious concern of harm from Dangerous, Drink & Drug and Disqualified Driving.

During 2023, there were 132 targets Op Dragoon raised with 46 resulting in a positive outcome. 24 of the positive outcomes resulted in arrests, whilst fines totalling over $\pounds4,000$ were seized and a total of 134 months of disqualified driving sentences were issued.

Community Speed Watch – as ever we are grateful to all our community volunteers who give up their time to be part of our journey. Over the last 12 months, the teams have collectively achieved:

- 371,795 vehicles monitored;
- **19,928 speeding drivers detected** (14% decrease, even though hours monitored increased) positive outcome; and
- 16,690 1st, 690 2nd and 68 3rd warning letters sent – shows positive impact achieved (now issued via automation).

Operation Snap - The public continue to support us by monitoring and submitting footage showing poor driver behaviour. Over the course of 2023, **6,040 submissions were made, 3,609 resulted in positive action** (approx. 60% of submissions) with this resulting in at least 1 NoIP sent to 2,553 registered keepers.

What's Next

- 12-month deployment of AI trailer to detect phone & seat belt offences;
- Continue phase one of upgrading camera technology; start planning and building cost estimates for phase two and seek approval;
- Confirm new site priorities based on Local Authority High Harm Routes;
- Complete integration of three former Police Teams into a single integrated Road Safety Team;
- Cameras issued via safety grant to horse riders, cyclists, motorcyclists & approved driving instructors to evidence poor driver behaviour;
- Continue to explore innovation and best practice targeting behaviours that pose dangers to road users (including world 1st deployments of impaired driving technology & noise detecting camera equipment); and
- Mobile speed enforcement (moving vehicle)

Activity B Training & Education

The following sections outline activities that the Partnership has delivered to make safe, those most vulnerable on our roads. Information is split into the six user groups: motorcyclists, young driver, pedestrians, older drivers, cyclists, and business drivers.

Importantly, this section starts with our collaborative response for post-crash care and response. As a Partnership we want to enhance collision survivability through expedient emergency medical care, create a safe working environment for first responders and support those who have experienced collisions or lost their loved ones.

Post Crash Care & Response

- Post Crash Victim Support during the first 9 months of our 3-year programme, 87 referrals have been supported; involved 50 fatal collisions, 31 serious or life changing injury and 6 who witnessed a collision;
- **75% of referrals made by Devon & Cornwall Police**, higher than the national average across the service of 60%, showing strong partnership collaboration;
- **Coroner fatal report** obtaining data and permissions continues to be a challenge. The team continue to actively engage with regional coroner services to find a solution;
- **TXA pilot project** workstream split into two parts. Part a) is public facing data collection survey, pilot data collection is complete (part b see What's Next);
- **New Bystander Tool** developed and tested a new tool for the identification of those with serious injuries following a motor vehicle collision. This tool is a world first, requires no monitoring equipment and performs better (on test data) than any of the established triage methods; and
- **Biker Down sessions** includes a module on post-crash (received by 287 riders).

What's Next

- Coroner Fatal Report Until permissions and data are granted, the team are developing a new post-collision reporting tool with data visualisation – intention is to create one for each of the safe systems pillars;
- TXA pilot (part b) establish new route to achieve ethics support, application in draft form;
- **Roadpeace** supporting Brake with setting up peer support group in Devon & Cornwall;
- Potential to support a referral to voice their story; and
- **Trauma Centre** for June Board approval, funding support to enable the UK's first Centre for Post-Collision Research, Innovation and Translation.

Motorcycling

- Secured Motorcycle Simulator ready for; deployment April 2024 onwards;
- 2. **Delivered 16 Bikerdown courses** (10 in Devon, 6 Cornwall) 287 riders trained;
- 3. **Biker Down Evaluation** progressing, completes early 2025 to inform future activity
- 4. Delivered 11 Bifesafe courses;
- Developed Street Wise (young riders) and Streets Ahead programmes - Street Wise delivered to 3 colleges; and
- 6. Attended Lincolnshire Partnership event to share our learning.

What's Next

- Develop long term delivery proposal for Bikerdown in Cornwall and partnership asset needs;
- Streetwise to conclude its pilot and become an official young rider intervention within colleges;
- Engage riders through colleges, events and dealerships with simulator programme – complete National Evaluation; and
- Continue close collaboration between key partners for motorcycle incident reduction.

Younger Driver

- Learn2Live theatre presentations and follow ups to 12,325 students (Jan-Dec 23);
- 13 schools (9 Devon / 4 Cornwall) opted for the virtual pack created as an online resource;
- Cornwall Fire & Rescue Service (CFRS) engaged 150 students Callywith College (75 received virtual L2L);
- **Delivered 5 Survive the Drive** education presentation to circa military 750 personnel;
- **Invested in The Honest Truth** app based education delivered by ADIs approximately 50 supported to date with increased numbers signing up;
- E-Mach Mustang engagement vehicle secured;













- Devon & Somerset Fire Rescue Service (DSFRS) now Road Safety Regional Leads & Young Driver Thematic Leads for National Fire Chiefs Council (NFCC);
- Developing a toolbox in collaboration with NFCC, all blue light partners and road safety officials to provide consistent road safety education throughout the UK;
- Virtual presentation given to Youth Offending Team in Devon; and
- **Partnership interventions** involving young riders, young drivers & passengers, one event completed in Devon with 15 students involved with Street Wise.
- **GCM Collaboration** social media presence continues to provide strong Partnership presence linking to young drivers, with series of videos created.
- **Social media subscribers** Tiktok 1.137m, Instagram 269k, YouTube 126k around 30-40m views per month; and
- During the academic year 2023/24 D&C Police presented at 6 colleges to **educate around the Fatal Five**, which is well received.

What's Next

- DSFRS speaking at Younger Driver Conference in London May 2024;
- Use BMW Crash Car education vehicle;
- Roll out the new L2L follow up presentation;
- Continue Learn2Live & Survive the Drive delivery;
- Continue to encourage ADIs to sign up for The Honest Truth, evaluate quantitative results;
- Continue partnership interventions involving young riders, young drivers and passengers. Two events scheduled May & July with expected audience of circa 90 students for Streetwise or L2L follow up sessions;
- Funding from VZSW contingency, supporting purchase of trailer to transport 50/50 car and wider resources for younger driver education that Cornwall Fire & Rescue Service delivery – collaboration to shape messaging;
- Consider future social media plan around car modifications and wider young driver messaging; and
- Parent Intervention project scoped, initial phase to complete with potential Road Safety Trust bid made.

Pedestrian

- Torbay funded school training programme covering 10 schools;
- In excess of 860 pupils trained in Plymouth;
- Walkability Devon's pedestrian programme scoped and underway; and
- **Pedestrian problem profile** completed to guide future activity through newly established task & finish group.

What's Next

 First 'Walkability' (Devon's Child Pedestrian Training programme) scheduled for 18th June. Expect circa 300 children to be trained by end of academic year. Target for the 24/25 is 3,500 children;

- Investing in Torbay to extend school pedestrian education programme;
- Cornish school pedestrian programme in development; and
- Pedestrian media campaign initial scoping meetings held and two areas in Plymouth identified to target initially.

Older Driver

- Driving Safer for Longer (DSFL) reestablished with Cornwall Mobility to deliver this training. Part-time resource now dedicated to book sessions with community groups. Three sessions held;
- Older Driver Event held March 2023 at St Bridgetts nursery nr Exeter, supported by multiple agencies. Engaged 30 drivers, with 75% taking and passing eyesight and reaction tests. Event well received by all;
- Responded to Call for evidence on Driver licensing for people with medical conditions – encouraged mandatory notification by health professionals; and
- **Medical profile** completed to guide future activity.

What's Next

- Replicating Older Driver events in North Devon and West Devon in the coming months ahead;
- DSFL to engage more groups and VZSW to consider utilising funding to offer subsidy to participants who book after presentation;
- Free Driver Assessment, consider links from DSFL, to encourage self-referral for those at risk;
- Cornwall Older Driver Event at Perranporth Airfield, secure multi-agency date in September;
- Cornwall Mobility engaging GPs regularly around the Driver Assessment referral route;









Cyclists

- Cyclists continue to support Op Snap with video evidence of poor behaviour with approx. 33% of submissions overall submitted from cyclist (peaks of up to 50% in warmer weather);
- Initial scoping for behaviour change, messaging & evaluation progressing - going out to tender, May 2024;
- Bikeability resilience in Devon supported; and
- Evaluation of cycle collision data complete.

What's Next

- Phase 2 of **Look out for cyclists' signage** to be installed at least 6 locations across D&C initially;
- Review Vivacity findings from key location in Devon – includes near miss module;
- Completion of messaging and evaluation project by autumn 2024; and
- Installation vehicle activated signs at a minimum of 5 identified sites supporting local highway authority partners and their communities.

Business Driver

- Established new task and finish group with key partners involved to work up future initiatives;
- In discussions with Corserv and National Highways regarding Wheelright tyre measurement technology;
- Working closely with D&C Police new Commercial Vehicle Unit to understand vulnerabilities associated with driving for business; and
- Reviewing partners' 'driving for work' documents to highlight best practice.

What's Next?

 Attend the Metropolitan Police Road Safety Road show in Cornwall (Corserv secured this) to understand how we can respond to business drivers being an 'at risk' road user group;









- Pilot utilisation of Wheelright technology at a CORSERV site in Cornwall. Intended to be available for 5 weeks for staff (including Cornwall Council) to have safety checks on vehicles;
- Consider future opportunities to engage businesses across our region using Wheelright and/or safety talks;
- Explore opportunities to evaluate National Highways dashcam programme that targeted A38 business drivers for qualitative feedback; and
- Business Drivers Road Safety Pledge consider development.

Community Road Safety Grant & Other

- 103 cameras issued to horse riders, motorcyclists & cyclists;
- 19 dashcams issued to Approved Driver Instructors;
- 236 visiwhips distributed to horse riders and / or for use at events;
- 1,270 reflective clips issued to schools and / or for use at events;
- 1,067 reflective tabards issued to schools or clubs;
- 18 banners purchased to provide direct support to schools;
- 40 parking buddies and 58 additional banners being ordered to local authority partners to support schools;
- 1,000 recycled reflective wristbands to support GWR Junior Lifesaving skills school engagement programme; and
- Supporting local authority partners with 5 sites with vehicle activated or mobile speed signs.







EMERGENCY SERVICES

What's Next

- Neurodiverse seat belt covers, enhances post-collision care and response; and
- Subsidised motorcycle training offer through IAM / RoSPA groups to conclude, review success.

Comms & Engagement

- Produced **2023 activity show reel** highlighting successes to be showcased at VZSW AGM in June;
- **"Tales from the Other Side of the Road"** campaigned launched. Henry Cole read the first letter more are in development;

- **Supporting Pacts** with Safe System Forum 4 workshops (2 attended) looking at application of safe systems and how we improve
- **Social media reach** includes 2.3 million on Facebook, 50,000+ on Instagram and 277,000+ on X (formerly Twitter);
- VZSW followers 4,900 on Facebook, 589 on Instagram and 1,210 on X; and
- Launched VZSW <u>Road Safety Pledge</u> circa 700 pledges made within initial few weeks, including those that signed up after applying for road safety resources.

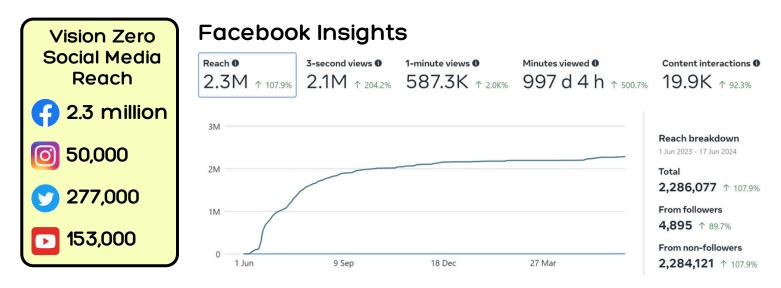


What's Next

- Continue engagement with PACTs;
- Develop proposals to target activity for a week without a road death campaign;
- Road Safety Village events, multi-agency programme at Devon County Show, Royal Cornwall Show, Plymouth Armed Forces and English Riviera. Pledge 'sign up' will be promoted (over 200 secured at Devon County Show);
- Launch next tranche of behaviour change motorcycle stories as part of our "Tales from the Other Side of the Road" campaign;
- VZSW will take control of Lift Legend from the Force as a comms project;
- VZSW website overhaul and refresh;
- Launch motorcycle safety video series with RiderCam TV;
- Deliver behaviour change pedestrian campaign;
- Engage a rider in a docuseries outlining personal journey, offering key tips and advice to others; and
- Development of next comms plan for approval.

Teams are now actively in discussion about delivery plans to start from September 2024. Should Board Members have particular areas they would like to see form part of future plans, these can be highlighted at the AGM.

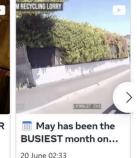

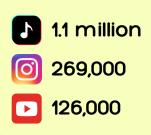
